

Willowwinders are...

Families from a variety of backgrounds regionally, nationally, and internationally join the Willowwind community each year representing diverse economic and ethnic backgrounds.

Every family has a "Why Willowwind" story. Some choose Willowwind because of the Montessori philosophy in preschool or the progressive, project-based learning in our K-6 program. Many are drawn to Willowwind's creative and inspiring learning environment. No matter the reason, Willowwind families come together each year to support the growth of their children both as individuals and as members of Willowwind's incredible learning community.



TRANSITION TO ONLINE

On March 15th, 2020 Iowa's Governor, Kim Reynolds recommended that schools close for four weeks in response to the confirmed community spread of Coronavirus (COVID-19) in our state. Willowwind made the difficult decision to close campus at that time and move to distance learning with plans to return on April 13th. However, on April 2nd the Governor recommended continued closure through the month of April and a week later that schools remain closed for the duration of the 2019-20 school year.

Through all of this uncertainty, Willowwind's goal was to provide a distance learning program that would minimize disruption to learning and continue to support the development of all students until we could be on-site again. Faculty and staff worked tirelessly for weeks ahead of the inevitable school closure announcement to ensure that Willowwind's transition to online learning would be as near to seamless as possible. Ahead of Spring Break, in anticipation of a closure, teachers sent home materials to aid in distance learning and provided support to families on how to navigate at-home learning with their student.

"One thing I like about online learning is that I can stay in my pajamas when I get up in the morning. One thing I am worried about is when we will be able to come back to school." Similar to on-site learning, distance learning varied between age groups and individual students. The amount of screen time was considered and ageappropriate activities were developed to best meet the curricular standards and objectives of the class. Willowwind faculty continued to encourage hands-on, cross-curricular projects, outdoor exploration, and maintained connections between grade groups through STEAM challenges, Group Discussion, and partner projects.

Together with parents, students, faculty, and staff, Willowwind was able to successfully provide continuous and purposeful learning opportunities for our students. We can now look back on this transition and know that we responded with agility, tenacity, perseverance, patience, and love.


MAINTAINING A COMMUNITY FOCUS

Through the annual Prairie Cafe, an entrepreneurial learning project by 5th/6th graders, Willowwind partners with local restaurants like Estela's Fresh Mex, The Wedge, and Jimmy Jack's to raise money for a 4-day class trip to YMCA Camp Edwards in Wisconsin. When Willowwind closed in the spring, the last few weeks of Prairie Cafe and the trip in April were canceled. Understanding the impact this pandemic would have on small businesses in our area, Willowwind's 5th/6th grade class donated over \$600 of their proceeds from Prairie Cafe back to these local restaurant partners in keeping with the school's mission of communityfocused learning and stewardship.

When Estella's owner, Jerry Vasquez, told Willowwind that this donation would help offset their cost to provide 200 lunches for UIHC healthcare workers, a collaboration was born. PreK-6 students took to their tablets to write and draw thank you notes that would accompany every meal.

HEARTS FOR HEALTHCARE WORKERS

Willowwind's Teaching Artist Ryan Bentzinger did an amazing job keeping students engaged in weekly art assignments. In early April, Ryan encouraged students to participate in the Hearts for Healthcare Workers movement. As a result, students created some awesome window art to show support for healthcare workers in their neighborhoods and wider community. Everyone had a chance to post their photos for classmates and other Willowwind families to see and enjoy. It was such fun to share in this project and feel that sense of community and support from home.











Rachel Berger joined Willowwind in the 2019-20 school year to further build and formalize the Social Emotional Learning (SEL) program. The main focus of Willowwind's SEL program is to teach students the tools they need to understand and control their emotions and reactions to different situations, in particular, moments where they may experience anger, anxiety, or stress. This begins with studying the mindful parts of the brain and how they work. During weekly SEL time, Willowwind's K-6 students learn about the amygdala, prefrontal cortex, and hippocampus. Students discover how strategies, such as mindful breathing can help bring the brain back into control. This learning is hugely important to students' emotional growth and wellbeing.

These learned skills were particularly important in the early days of the pandemic. Students felt comfortable to express, through remote teaching, their anxieties and their stress at being in a very different, confusing and sometimes scary situation. By using skills such as mindfulness they were able to take a step back, assess the situation, and think about what they could and couldn't control. Students established meditation spaces and places of relaxation away from their work space. Activities such as meditation and growth mindset allowed students to rethink how they approached and navigated this unusual time.

END OF YEAR CELEBRATIONS

Willowwind spends the school year intentionally building community, fostering relationships across grade groups, and embracing each indivivdual for who they are. As a result, end of year events are really celebrations of how far students have come both as individuals and as community members. The talent show provides students an opportunity to share their many skills in spoken word, art, dance, music, etc. They share favorite memories from the year during the final Group Discussion and get all their pent up sillies out with challenge courses and variations of group tag.

Needless to say, this year's celebrations were a bit different via Zoom, but the community spirit was in no way diminished. Students logged in and cheered their friends on during the talent show, recalled and laughed at the great memories they made, and showed our departing 6th graders just how much their leadership and friendship meant. We could not be more proud of how students, families, faculty, and staff demonstrated agility and perseverance through such a strange time.

IMPACT ON SUMMER PROGRAM

By June 22nd, 2020 Willowwind had canceled the first six weeks of its Summer Program to help flatten the COVID-19 curve in our community. Willowwind typically serves about 240 children in Iowa City and surrounding communities each summer. Tuition from the Summer Program is a significant portion of Willowwind's operating budget each year. The necessary cancellations took a toll as Summer Program revenue dipped by about 82% from the year prior.

Though Willowwind was not able to serve the Iowa City community in the same way it does each summer, staff continued to think of ways to engage students over the summer months. Willowwind announced the pilot of Camp Kits, a new at-home addition to Willowwind's Summer Program. This opportunity provided families with weekly kits full of themed, age-appropriate activities for PreK-6th grade students. More than 150 Camp Kits were purchased over seven weeks in June and July.

After many weeks of research and planning and with safety measures in place, Willowwind opened to 28 PreK-6th grade campers from July 12th to August 7th. Students explored STEAM themes like chemistry, physics, fine arts, and more. This was also a great opportunity for Willowwind to refine new safety procedures before the start of the school year.



RECRUITMENT DURING A PANDEMIC

There is no question that the best way to experience the learning environment at Willowwind is to interact with it and see it in action. Sadly, the pandemic forced school closure and put a halt to campus events and visits. The inevitable cancellation of many local festivals, events, and other opportunities also impacted Willowwind's ability to engage with the community.

Willowwind adapted and developed new ways to connect with prospective families when in person visits and tours were not possible. Posts on social media outlets highlighted how Willowwind's small size and independence allowed the school to adapt quickly in order to provide a stellar online experience for all students. Several spots in newspapers and television drew considerable attention from the community at large and sparked new admissions inquiries for the 2020-21 school year.

Without the option of walking families through the school, Willowwind developed a virtual tour of the building and grounds. This tool introduced new families to the school in place of the in-person tour. In addition, Willowwind hosted two virtual open house events in place of the traditional on-site format usually held in the spring.

Another key step in the enrollment process is the classroom visit. Prior to the pandemic all prospective students would visit the classroom for an hour or more to allow further interaction with teachers, peers, and staff. During the closure, classroom visits were replaced with a Zoom visit between teachers, prospective student, and parents.

Pivoting in this way allowed families to interact with Willowwind in a meaningful way and make informed decisions about their child's education.

Johnson County Climate Change Grant

Thanks to an application submitted by parents, Willowwind was the recent recipient of the Iowa City Community Partnership Climate Action Grant. An award of \$4,200 will be given to support a "Childrento-Children Climate Actions" project at Willowwind. The project will focus on composting and waste reduction; gardening, local food, and healthy plant-based diets; and storm water management through green infrastructure. In addition to funding student-created communication and outreach materials, the grant will provide partial support, in conjunction with Give & Grow funds, for the construction of raised beds for the school garden, and contribute to rehabilitating and showcasing the existing Willowwind prairie and bioswale areas.

These focus areas were strategically selected because they are mutually supportive and build on Willowwind's existing assets. The grant will support setting up a school-wide composting program, which will in turn support Willowwind's waste reduction goals and gardening efforts. The students will participate in the composting program, document it, and communicate the benefits through outreach projects. Grant funds will provide support for the construction of raised beds for the garden, which will increase on-site food production. Students will document and communicate their experience with planting, growing and eating from the garden. Finally, the grant will contribute to updating and showcasing the existing Willowwind prairie and bioswale which mitigate neighborhood storm water runoff.

PHASE 1: WEED AND HIGH MOW

Sustainable Landscape Solutions (SLS), a local small business, worked with Willowwind's Facilities Committee to determine the best course of action for this project. The first order of business was for SLS to identify and remove non-native species and volunteer saplings, in both the prairie and bioswale starting early summer. Next, the prairie received a high mow, cutting grasses back to further clear debris and encourage growth. Finally, Willowwind's two green roofs were tended and weeded.

PHASE 2: CONTROLLED BURN

Prairies are fire-dependent ecosystems so controlled burns will be a vital part of maintaining our prairie. Burning discourages growth of invasive species, encourages germination of natives, and releases nutrients that rejuvenate the soil. We can expect to burn every five years.

Willowwind had hoped to complete its second prairie burn this past spring, but was unable to obtain a burn permit due to COVID-19. Willowwind now hopes that a burn will be possible in spring 2021.

Give & Grow

2019 - 2020

Each year during the month of April, GreenState Community Credit Union matches donations to schools through its Give and Grow campaign. This year, Willowwind's campaign focused on the 21st century classroom. Willowwind's classroom vision provides flexibility in its physical space and seating options; purposeful technology for optimal projectbased, inclusive learning; and functional, flexible learning environments that inspire and invite exploration. This campaign raised \$14,525 which will allow the school to further enhance classrooms. Willowwind has purchased several flexible seating options, furniture, and classroom technology. These upgrades have been particularly beneficial going into the 2020-21 school year as learning spaces were expanded to allow for social distancing.

PHASE 3: PLANT AND SEED

Happily, Willowwind's bioswale is already bursting with a wide variety of native plants so most of our focus for planting and seeding will be on the two swaths of prairie on campus. We've used these past several months to observe the prairie's growth and the plant species currently present. Once the burn is completed work can begin to plant and/or seed additional species to further diversify these important native habitats and feeding grounds for pollinators and other ecologically beneficial creatures.

PHASE 4: MAINTAIN. LEARN. ENJOY.

A primary goal of this grant is to educate students and visitors about Willowwind's native spaces. To this end, informational signage will be created to accompany the bioswale, prairie, and other key areas on campus. Visitors will be able to enjoy selfguided tours of Willowwind's grounds to learn more about the importance of native spaces and discover some of the plant and animal species thriving on campus. These areas will enhance environmental education and serve as a living testament to Willowwind's commitment to stewardship and sustainability.

2018 - 2019

Willowwind sought to enhance its outdoor spaces through environmental education opportunities. Our students and faculty have always worked to demonstrate the importance of the humanland connection through academics, enrichment, volunteerism, and in practice. The 2018-19 initiative raised \$8,546, to further our mission of respecting and caring for the environment.



In 2019-20, 52% of families benefited from sliding scale tiered tuition. Additionally, 24% of families benefited from further financial aid awards. These additional funds are often the deciding factor for families who would not otherwise be able to give their children the exceptional education Willowwind offers. Increasing our scholarship funding would enable Willowwind to broaden its reach even further, impacting many more families and students in our community.



The Paycheck Protection Program is a loan from the Small Business Administration designed to provide a direct incentive for small businesses to keep their workers on payroll. Willowwind was granted a (forgivable) loan to minimize economic impacts to employees due to COVID-19.

Cancellation of previously scheduled 2020 Summer Program classes decreased summer revenue by 82% compared to Summer Program 2019.

Willowwind pivoted and launched Camp Kits which provided 6 weeks of at-home summer activities; and ran a 4-week reboot of Summer Program with a small group of campers. These two fantastic replacement programs helped recoup 25% of that lost revenue.

2019-20 Grant Awards

STEM SCALE-UP PROGRAM (PreK, \$6,280)

Light & Shadow curriculum engages students in the processing of engineering design and the constraints of physics while casting different kinds of light to develop shadows. Grant funding supported curriculum, materials, professional development, and an educator stipend.

PROJECT LEAD THE WAY (1st/2nd, \$5,100)

The 1st/2nd grade class utilized PLTW to encourage students to become collaborators and hands-on problem solvers. Grant funding supported teacher training and access to PLTW curriculum.

IC CLIMATE ACTION PLAN (Community, \$4,200)

Ongoing projects have utilized \$1,548.37 thus far with work to continue spring 2021.

STEM SCALE-UP PROGRAM (K-2nd, \$705)

Differentiated Math Centers serve as supplemental resources to support classroom learning. Included three levels of resources and manipulatives to support personalized learning.

FARM TO EARLY CARE EDUCATION (PreK, \$300)

We are currently on the last year of a 3 year cycle for this grant which supports environmental education.
